Detecting Social Security Fraud

Scams are happening in every aspect of our lives, including Social Security. So how do you protect yourself and others from becoming a victim? Here's some helpful tips from the Social Security Administration to keep you and your personal information safe.

The Social Security Administration will never threaten, scare, or pressure you to take an immediate action. If you receive a call, text, or email that threatens to suspend your Social Security number, warns of arrest or legal action, demands immediate payment, pressures you for personal information, or threatens to seize your bank account it's a scam.

If you receive any of these suspicious notifications, ignore them and do not give them money or any personal information. Try to stay calm and hang up or ignore the message. Government employees will not threaten you or try to gain your trust by sending you pictures or documents. The next step is to report the scam to the SSA Office of the Inspector General (OIG). Even if you have shared personal information or suffered financial loss already from the scam, do not be embarrassed and report it.
